PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE— BY SUSAN STEELE, MS, RN, CWOCN

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
What's In A Name?

I am NOT, nor shall I ever be a "WOCN".
Please don't misunderstand this statement. I attended an ETNEP, graduating in 1993, and for the past 13 years have practiced in the specialty of Wound, Ostomy, and Continence

nursing. I am proud of my specialized nursing practice and of my affiliation with the organization known as the WOCN. But I am not a WOCN. Over the past 10 years, I have often heard colleagues use the term "WOCN" to refer to themselves or another WOC nurse. Although I am 100% certain that nothing malicious or fraudulent was ever intended by such statements, it is important to share a reminder that use of the initials W-O-C-N as a job title or credential is inaccurate and misleading to both colleagues and the lay public, and does harm to our association.

Recently, I received a telephone call from a *very* angry nurse who had attended an educational program in a state within the

geographic boundaries of the



banner head of the program flier. There was absolutely no connection between the program and the Southeast Region or the national WOCN. I truly wanted to help this fellow nurse resolve her issues, and felt powerless to do so. After we concluded our phone conversation, I continued to be concerned about (a) the fact that the name of our association was used inappropriately and (b) as a result, a professional nurse now has a very negative opinion of our organization. WOCN is a trademarked name for our association and any other use of the acronym is not only inappropriate, it is illegal.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE ANN KAHL, MS, RN, CWOCN

Congressional briefing

On November 2, 2005 the WOCN Society in conjunction with the Pedorthic Foot Association (PFA) hosted a Congressional educational briefing. It was held at the Cannon House Office Building on Capitol Hill. WOCN Society's new legislative consultant Bill Applegate and Suzy Dumont arranged the meeting.

Congresswoman Carolyn McCarthy is the lead sponsor of H.R, 1416, the Medicare Diabetic Footwear Quality Restoration Act of 2005. She is also a nurse. This bill would amend the Medicare Prescriptive Law of 2003 that reduced the payment for orthotics for diabetics.

Approximately 20 congressional staffers attended. After the Congresswoman welcomed the group, WOCN President Margaret Goldberg (FL) introduced our society. Several speakers represented our interests. Cindy Kiely, CWCN from the WOCN Public Policy Committee and resident of McCarthy's district discussed scope and cost of Diabetes to Medicare and the quality of life. Dr Teresa Kelechi, (SC) CWCN described the gaps in Medicare coverage and how it affects the access to care and the ongoing treatment of Diabetics.

Also in the hour long presentation PFA president Executive Director described Medicare coverage/lack of coverage of Diabetic footwear. The PFA also demonstrated some orthotics.

Follow up to our educational briefing will be facilitated by Bill Applegate on behalf of the WOCN society.



"CETN" still in use by some authors in professional publications. Since all of the persons originally certified as CETN have now either expired or been re-certified with the new credentials of the Wound, Ostomy and Continence Nurses Certification Board, the use of this set of initials could also be considered fraudulent. Regular contributors to newsletters, continuing education offerings, trade publications or other non-specialty journals may find that a well-meaning editor or program organizer simply used the same biographical information that was on file from a past contribution and was unaware of any changes.

What is in a name? Apologies to Billy Shakespeare aside, a rose by any other name just may be another flower. I have only had one name my entire life. In 1977 when I chose to marry, I also chose to retain the name that my parents gave me at birth. I was not a Hollywood celebrity, nor was I heir to a large fortune, so I am certain that many friends and family members thought my decision strange. My beloved did not have an embarrassing or hardto-spell last name, and I was not trying to revolutionize the institution of marriage. My name was, and is, my personal and professional identity. Like it or not, a name represents who we are and what we believe to other people who know us or know about us. In earlier times. duels were fought and lawsuits waged in an effort to defend the honor of one's name. In the current information age, identity theft is a serious crime. There are lots of people who know that what is in a name is powerful stuff indeed.

Just as we protect our personal identity to avoid becoming the victim of a thief, it is important to recognize the importance of protecting your professional identity as well. To protect your own good name, and the integrity of our association, please take a few minutes at the start of the new year to do the following:

- Review all business cards, pamphlets, fliers and other material that may include your name and professional credentials to be certain that they are accurate and up to date. Insist on seeing a proof before publication or printing.
- Never sign letters, medical records or any other documents with "WOCN". Use correct legal title and appropriate credentials only.
- Do not allow your employer or colleagues to refer to you as "the WOCN". Learn to tactfully and politely correct the error.
- If you become aware of a colleague's misuse of the society's name or of professional credentials, point out the error and request correction. Chances are, the mistake is not intended as deception, and your colleague will appreciate the feedback.

Each member of the society has an obligation to the future integrity of the association. As members of the WOCN, we owe it to ourselves and to our future colleagues to be sure we say what we mean. Names do matter.

The criteria and application for this grant and award is on SER web page. Deadline is May 30, 2006.


WOC Rookie of the Year Award.
