Create positive perception

- Avoid being a constant complainer
- When you do have a concern, use the positive, negative, positive (PNP) approach to discuss it.

Develop a relationship with the CNO or the person you report to

- Their support can be crucial
- If you look good, they look good

Get results

- Reduce nosocomial pressure ulcers
- Reduce costs, increase revenue, increase referrals

Brag on yourself

- If you do any of the above, be sure you share it
- Promote your practice
- Share success stories

Get patients to sing your praises

- Conduct patient satisfaction surveys and share the results
- Pay attention and make improvements
- Ask patients to put their compliments in writing
- Share complimentary comments with Administration

Submit articles to organizational newsletter

- What are you doing that is newsworthy?
- What do you do that's unique in your area? (Examples: WOC nurses to conduct quarterly prevalence studies, wound care team to serve as preceptors, wound nurses attended regional conference).

Work with marketing to develop brochure

- Drop off copies to physician offices
- Take to hospital events, health fairs
- Sent to local urgent care centers

Organize outreach programs

• Organize a health fair, diabetes fair

• Offer an ostomy clinic or product fair

Collaborate with other departments

- Offer inservices on nursing units
- Present programs to MD's
- Offer specific inservices for specialty groups such as burn

to let one of us go. It was me of course! Good management decision for sure! So Barbara and I moved along our chosen paths. I got married to a doctor, pursued my dual masters degrees, and she eventually moved on to publish more and establish her career with Medline.

Even though we lived on opposite coasts, we kept in contact...of course me picking her brain, she encouraging me and teaching me very valuable lessons in life. Some of those lessons I'm sure she taught many of you such as; choose your battles, figure out who is in bed with who before you go spouting off about one or the other, follow your instincts, it is best to sit back, listen, and think things through before taking action or speaking. I don't know how many times I asked her "what is the name of that ulcer that crops up just before people die?". Every time she'd say just as kindly and calmly as the time before "a Kennedy Ulcer".

There are so many more things to say about her like: what a dynamic speaker she was, what a fountain of knowledge she was, what a beautiful and kind person she was, and how much she taught and tolerated me. I know that each person who knew her was touched in similar ways and even so much more.

I remember when we were having one of our phone conversations; she told me that she had been diagnosed with ovarian cancer. It was like someone shot me in the gut. Not her....why her? ... As the 2 year long battle played out, her husband Wally always by her side. She dealt with chemo, radiation, several surgeries, infections, hospitalizations and all the pain and fear that obviously went along with this ugly and cruel disease. I would visit when I could. So amazing she always had

the spirit of winning, overcoming, being stronger than IT was. Her knowledge, courage and yes her insatiable will to live along with all the wonders of modern medicine, the wonders of all the things that she was taught, had taught, and proclaimed to others (colleagues and patients alike) and believed in, would make her all better, a rare statistic...a survivor. She and Wally on that Harley, riding like the wind!!!

After all she and Wally went through.. On October 2, 2006, Barbara lost her battle. I was so blessed to be part of that last 24 hours of her life. I had been at a wound conference in Orlando and had promised to come see her and Wally that Sunday at the close of the conference. I was so glad to have kept that promise.

As soon as I walked in her room. I knew this was it...the end... I asked Wally and her mom if I could have some time alone with her. I laid down next to her, held her, kissed her hands, and forehead. Told her how much she meant to me, thanked her for teaching me, being my mentor, being my friend, inspiring me and so many others. I told her it was okay to let go and be free. She spoke inaudibly in and out of lucidity...I laughed and babbled about things we had laughed a babbled about....and I cried. I said good bye to my dear friend that day.

So to all of you who knew her, we can thank God for giving us the privilege. For those who didn't, I am truly sorry you missed the opportunity to experience her light.
