

The NC group's research project, article, "NC WOC Examines Suspected Deep Tissue Injury" has been submitted to JWOCN.

Discussion was also related to a Senate Ostomy Bill authored by Senator Burr but not yet in effect. The bill should reflect the skills of the ostomy nurse, and rescission of the 2.3% medical device tax that will become effective in 2013. Ostomy supplies will be impacted by this tax. A total of 2 ½ days were spent in Washington advocating for the needs of our patients and our profession.

Summer WOC'N in South Carolina

Success Tale

One tidbit for us to remember: Be persistent and never give up! If you know or have a gut feeling that something needs to be done for your patient…be persistent, even pushy, if necessary.



Case in point: Patient with quadriplegia secondary trauma; developed Stage IV pressure ulcer with osteo (4 x 6 x 4 with 4-6 cm tunneling/undermining). Treated with Cipro PO for 6 weeks per infectious disease. I questioned effectiveness of this order but was told that this was adequate. Continued to treat the wound with everything but the kitchen sink! Wound decreased in depth/undermining and then increased. This continued for several months with little progress and with me continuing to press every new Hospitalist that came through the unit that I thought he had chronic osteo. Despite excellent nutritional interventions (thanks to my dietitian); excellent pressure relief (thanks to the Kin-Air bed and nursing staff); excellent wound care (thanks to my PT dept for MIST, advanced therapies/dressings (silver alginates, lododorb gel, Dakins, VAC, OASIS, Prisma, yada, yada, yada!), and nursing staff...(I'll take a little credit here too!); and overall excellent medical management, his prealbumin remained relatively low (12-14), his inflammatory markers were elevated, and his wound was slow to non-healing. Finally, a Hospitalist listened. MRI revealed osteo. Plastics consulted and after our discussion agreed to a flap. Bone debrided, culture done (thank goodness) and appropriate antibiotic for osteo started (IV!), flap done!! Patient is 3 weeks post-op and flap looks great. He is still on antibiotics and his prealbumin is now 18. "Pushy" may not seem like the right word after many months, but you have to be pushy with "charm" in the south and it may take longer! However, my point is: be persistent and pushy for your patients if you know what needs to be

done...no matter how long it takes! We have the knowledge; we have to use it for our patients!

Charleston CWCN receives funding from NIH....

Dr. Teresa Kelechi, PhD, GCNS-BC, CWCN,

Associate Professor, College of Nursing, Medical University of South Carolina was recently awarded a multi-million dollar grant from the National Institute of Nursing Research to study the effects of a cryotherapy gel cuff on blood flow and venous leg ulcer occurrence in patients with chronic venous disorders. The cuff, designed to slide onto the lower leg, will be tested over a 9-month period, where the patient will use the cuff while elevating the leg on a special pillow, for 30 minutes each day, for the first month of the study. Patients will take their leg temperatures before and after the treatment, to monitor how cold the skin gets to prevent injury and to see if the skin temperature stays down over time. Each month the frequency of using the cryotherapy cuff will be reduced until prn, around month 7. Patients will keep track of the skin temperatures, in hopes of reducing the temperature by about 2 degrees, and sustaining the reduced temperature over time. The theory is that if inflamed skin, commonly associated with venous disorders is cooled and stays cool, blood flow will be reduced (high blood flow is associated with ulcers) and it will be less like to ulcerate. Dr. **Kelechi** has several publications related to her previous work with cyrotherapy and the use of thermometers to measure skin temperature. She hopes to add skin temperature monitoring to the standard of care (compression, leg elevation, physical activity) for patients with chronic venous

disorders. Once a baseline temperature has been established, patients will monitor skin temperature several times a week, and if an increase of about 4 degree over baseline is noticed, the patient will cool the skin, and thus, prevent a leg ulcer.
