Spotlight on 2012 Rookie of the Year: Ramona Reed-Chism, BSN, RN, CWOCN

Ramona functioned as a wound care nurse before attending Emory University's WOCNEP. She was recognized as a wound care champion while serving as a staff nurse and was quickly recruited to assist the WOC nurses. She enthusiastically embraced wound care and her skill level soared. Her calm but confident demeanor designated Ramona as the patient's, staff nurses and physician's choice to provide WOC nursing care.

Ramona's experience in the military is evident. She leads with a level of knowledge and professionalism which is admired by her peers and affords her a high level of respect. Her skills are evident as she organizes and leads monthly hospital wound care orientation for new hires. She is also the wound care nurse of choice by the vascular and general surgeons in her facility with which she leads the daily wound care team. She is organized in her daily care methods as well as in her ability to plan future events.

Ramona organizes and implements biannual wound nurse expert training. She schedules speakers within and outside her health care facility, orders meals, and provides CE credit which trains 15-20 nurses during this two day event. The presenters provide education regarding wound, ostomy and continence care. There are also hands on product and treatment demonstration. Ramona provides the practical application for every day nursing in these events which in turn supports better care and outcomes for all hospital and community health facility patients. These wound nurse experts are then called upon to share their knowledge with their peers and serve as wound care champions in their respective units. When NDNQI and P&I studies are required in the facility, these nurses are given the opportunity to get involved and designate themselves as leaders. They also become the "go-to" person to share new product, prevention or treatment modalities.

SER WOCN 2013 Conference



Other news from around the State:


- Children's of Alabama now has a full time WOC nurse. Jennifer Day is now providing specialty care to our state's littlest patients.




