



2014 ELECTION INFORMATION

The SER WOCN Board of Directors manages the SER WOCN Society and all of its interests and affairs. It also sets the SER WOCN Society's direction, goals and priorities. Board Members have two mandatory Board meetings a year, one in the winter and one before the annual SER WOCN Conference. The term of each position is two years with a two term limit.

Open for election are three Board positions:

1. President-Elect

The President-Elect shall perform the duties of the President in the absence or incapacity of the President. The President-Elect shall succeed to the office of the President in the event it shall become vacant. The President-Elect shall perform such duties as may be delegated by the President or the SER Board of Directors. The President-Elect shall serve as the SER WOCN Society liaison to the WOCN Public Policy Subcommittee. The President-Elect shall be responsible for maintaining the SER WOCN Society Bylaws and the policy/procedure manual.

2. Director of Awards

The Director of Awards serves as the coordinator of the Youth Rally Sponsorship, SER WOC Nurse of the Year, Rookie of the Year Award, Dorothy Doughty Research Grant and the Fall Conference Scholarships.

3. Director of Communications

The Director of Communications shall serve as the editor of the SER WOCN Society Newsletter and as webmaster for the SER WOCN Society website. The candidate must be proficient in Microsoft Office applications and basic computer skills.

Award and Scholarship Recognition Time



The Award and Scholarship time is fast approaching for our prospective recipients to be recognized at our annual Fall SER WOCN Society Conference presentation in Alabama. We have many deserving nurses who have dedicated their lives to our WOC nurse profession. These nurses strive consistently to deliver expert care to our trusting patients, families and significant others who have embarked on a journey that may seem hopeless; challenging and devastating physically, financially and emotionally. The expertise, compassion and tender loving care of the WOC nurse offers hope and light at the end of the tunnel for our often challenging patients. By promoting patient education and involvement in clinical and research opportunities, the interdisciplinary team promotes positive behavior and change essential in healing. Are you that nurse or do you know a nurse who fills these shoes? Please take time to nominate yourself or a colleague who deserves to be recognized for their contribution to our patients and SER WOCN Society. I read an article in a nursing journal about twenty years ago comparing patients who enter the hospital to a person traveling to a foreign country without a passport; as "helpless, dependent and anxious" from the unknown and trusting someone will be available to guide and provide security. During the Winter Board Meeting, the Board made updates to clarify and improve the efficacy of the awards and scholarships. (The WOC Nurse Week Award was discontinued due to lack of applicants.)

These awards include:

- Host State Recognition Award (State Honoree)
- Dorothy Doughty Research Grant

• SER Annual Fall Conference Scholarships The revision for this scholarship has changed
from six (6) \$750 scholarships to five (5) \$1200
scholarships for SER WOCN Society members.
All expenses to include conference registration,
meals, hotel and travel are the responsibility of
the recipient. The \$1200 scholarship award will
be presented at conference to offset conference
expenses. Winners must be present to receive the
award.

A recipient cannot receive SER WOCN Conference scholarship / award assistance 2 consecutive years.

- Youth Rally Scholarship for Camp SER WOCN Society donated \$2000. "The Youth Rally is a community for adolescents with bowel or bladder diseases. Young people with diagnoses like these often feel alienated because they do not know of anyone who shares their medical or emotional experiences. Young people learn independence, gain confidence, and find understanding and support through the camp." This is for campers' 11-17 years of age and is an annual summer event held at a different college campus each year. This year it will be at San Diego State University, July 7-12. 


From Donna Geiger:

We are assessing all patients in the MISU/SICU daily for presence of pressure ulcers. Data is collected by RNs who have completed the Wound Treatment Associate (WTA) course. The purpose of the study is to evaluate the effectiveness of having a WTA (expert) in the ICU. WTAs will assess patients daily for present on admission pressure ulcers and/ or hospital acquired pressure ulcers, complete accurate documentation (staging, description, etc.) and accurately place an order to the wound care team. The project's date of completion is March 31, 2014.

I am currently attending Chamberlain College of Nursing for FNP. I hope to complete the program in October 2015. A new ostomy support group has been implemented in Fernandina Beach, Florida. The meetings will be held the last Monday of every month.
